Dr. Steve Atwater joined UA in Nov. 2014 after five years as superintendent of the Kenai Peninsula Borough School District, where he was named Alaska's 2013 Superintendent of the Year. Prior to his work for KPBSD, Dr. Atwater taught secondary education and served consecutively as head teacher, curriculum coordinator and superintendent for the Lake & Peninsula School District in King Salmon, AK. Atwater's experience with the Alaska education system extends to his own professional training, as he earned both his master's in education and his doctorate in educational leadership from the University of Alaska Fairbanks.

Dr. Hella Bel Hadj Amor leads technical assistance and research, primarily in educator effectiveness and equity at Education Northwest. She also leads REL Northwest's Oregon Leadership Network Research Alliance, which focuses on reducing disparities in graduation rates and exclusionary disciplinary actions for different subgroups of students. Before joining Education Northwest, Hella directed Teacher Effectiveness Research and Evaluation for the District of Columbia Public Schools and supported the design of educator evaluation systems in New York State and Massachusetts.

Brad Billings works as the School Improvement and Support Administrator at the Alaska Department of Education & Early Development. While he currently works outside the classroom to support statewide education policy, he is most proud of his work as a math and science teacher in Alaska's rural Bering Strait and urban Juneau School Districts. He holds a Bachelor of Science degree in Zoology and Secondary Education from Brigham Young University and a Master in Public Administration degree from Harvard's Kennedy School of Government. He is a member of the Alaska State Council for AdvanceD working to support school accreditation.

Dr. Dayna DeFeo is a Research Associate at the Center for Alaska Education Policy Research. She has worked in higher education for over 10 years, first as an adjunct instructor and later as an academic advisor, institutional researcher, and assessment coordinator. She came to the University of Alaska in 2010 and joined ISER/CAEPR in 2014. Most recently, her work has focused on transitions to college, particularly in the career and technical fields and for underrepresented populations. She currently teaches courses in education and career and technical education, and enjoy working with students at the graduate and undergraduate level.

Lexie Domaradzki started as an elementary school teacher more than 20 years ago and has since dedicated her professional life to high quality education for all. She provides consultation and professional development services to the Alaska, Oregon, Montana and Idaho Departments of Education, and the Alaska Staff Development Network. She has served as a Research Associate at RMC Research in Portland, Oregon, where she provided technical assistance on the implementation of Reading First grants for the National Reading Technical Assistance Center. Prior to RMC Research, Lexie served as the Assistant Superintendent of Teaching and Learning for the Washington State Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction. From 2004 to 2007 she was the Washington Reading First Director, directing the implementation of the Washington Reading First grant.

Bobbi Jo Erb is a self-proclaimed "Math Geek". Currently, she works as a math consultant with districts in Alaska and Idaho on best practices in mathematics instruction. Formerly, she was the Executive Director of Curriculum and Instruction and the STEM: Math Curriculum Coordinator for the Anchorage School District. Ms.Erb has 20 years of classroom teaching experience ranging from 6th grade through middle school, high school and the university level. While in the classroom, Ms. Erb received the Milken Educator Award, and the American Star of Teaching Award from the U.S. Department of Education. She firmly believes in the inherent beauty of mathematics and the right and ability of all students to enjoy that beauty.

Josh Gill is the Director of Personnel and Student Services for the Lower Kuskokwim School District. He has been with LKSD since 2003 in teacher, principal and district office roles.
